Widening access to post graduate courses.

1) Objective

- a. To introduce vocational education.
- b. To make education available at Post graduate level.

1) Need addressed and the context:

- a. There is less scope for employment and self-employment in traditional education i.e. B.A. and B. Com. Courses offered by our college. There is an urgent need of introducing vocational courses.
- b. A large number of students not only from our institution but from other institutions also need to do M.A. in English and Yogshashtra as there is no department in the university of Yogashashtra and there are limited seats available for the students in the department of English of the University.

4) The Practice

- a. The vision of the institution is 'Empowerment of Women' and one of the mission statement is 'dissemination of education'. To fulfil these we started M.A. II in English and Yoga Shashtra after getting the due sanction from the Government of Maharashtra and their affiliation from Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Applications were invited by the students, admission list was displayed and qualified teachers were appointed. Hostel facilities were provided to the needy students.
- b. We started skill based B. Voc. Course in 1) Retail Management and I. T. and 2) Food Processing and Management to provide the students more employment and self-employment opportunities sponsored by UGC, New Delhi and affiliated by Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Awareness was created amongst the students and parents about these courses as they were newly introduced in the area of Shivaji University. Applications were invited by the students. Qualified teachers were appointed. Hostel facilities were provided to the needy students.

5) Evidence of Success:

- **a.** This year M.A. II started. The success rate is 71.00 % as reflected in the result. There are ample opportunities for them.
- **b.** The students (4) from B. Voc. course in Retail Management have got employment opportunities in Shoppers Stop Pvt. Ltd. in the very first year through campus placement. Two of our students from food processing and management have started their self employment unit.
